HUMAN KINDNESS

Conceived and created by Dennis Corcoran

Human Kindness is a 6 min., 20 sec. story of a homeless person whose entire "life" fits into an old grocery cart.

Repulsive and repulsed, this person, "no more crazy than the rest of us", experiences the unfair judgment and rejection of others but also acts of human kindness which give rise to a like response.

Human Kindness is a piece of performance art or physical theatre told through movement, mime, and exaggerated physical expression against an aural backdrop of a compilation of singers/songwriters performing an adaptation of Randy Newman's I Think It's Going to Rain.

CAST REQUIREMENTS

Homeless Person – 1 M or 1 F Rejectors – 1 M and 2 F Acceptors – 2 F and 1 child

REHEARSAL NOTES

Rehearsals will consist of exploring appropriate story-telling movements, scenes and vignettes based on study of the real-world experiences of those who live on the streets as interpreted by the members of the ensemble.

The final production piece will be a devised work created and performed by the ensemble under the direction of Dennis Corcoran. Research notes on homelessness will be provided by Dennis.

NOTE: While there is no script, per se, the piece is challenging for all of that.

- 3. The English homeless man who gave all his money to a young student for a taxi
- 4. The US homeless man, given \$100, spent it all on food for other homeless folks
- 5. The final bit of tune he runs to one side, picks up umbrella, runs back to give it

Choreography

All thoughts on choreography, at this point, are written in pencil in my sketch book. They are, therefore, tentative and subject to change based on the cast's abilities, looks, and interests in terms of where they each wish to take their character.

Props and/or Set Pieces

Grocery cart – ideally beat up, metal, rusted – containing ...

Large trash bags stuffed with "stuff" – indicating his/her entire life is in this cart

Mirror – a broken piece of or shard of shiny, reflective plastic

Large umbrella – don't know color - same as that of Woman's slicker – ideally shiny

Actor's box or two
